Early voting for the 2023 General Election available now at Town Hall

Election Day is Tuesday, November 7. Early voting for the 2023 General Election begins Wednesday, October 11 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the Community Room at Schererville Town Hall. 10 East Joliet St., and will continue through Monday, November 6.

Hours are 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Mondays. Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays in October. Voters can cast their ballots from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Thursdays in October, and from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, October 28.

During the first week of November, the polls will be open from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Wednesday. Friday and Saturday; and from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Thursday. On Monday, the day before the General Election, early voting will be available from 9 a.m. until noon.

According to public law, Indiana residents are required to present a government-issued ID before casting their ballots. That ID needs to meet certain criteria:

- · Must display your photo
- · Must include your name as it conforms to your voter registration record



- Must display an expiration date
- · Must be issued by the State of Indiana or the U.S. government.

In most cases, an Indiana driver's license. Indiana photo ID card, Military ID or U.S. Passport is sufficient. A student ID from an Indiana State school may only be used if it meets all four criteria specified above.

Schererville firefighter officially sworn in, other firefighters honored

On October 5, Jason Noto was officially sworn in as a full-time Schererville firefighter/EMT during the Board of Safety meeting.

Noto, 22, was originally hired by the Schererville Fire Department as a part-time firefighter in November 2022 and then hired as a fulltime firefighter/EMT on August 20, said Fire Chief Robert Patterson. Prior to being hired by the Schererville Fire Department, Noto was a volunteer firefighter with the Highland Fire Department. He will enroll in paramedic school in January 2024.

"During that meeting, we also honored other Schererville firefighters for their actions during a residential fire in February," Chief Patterson said.

"Captain Valentino Trevino and Firefighter/EMT Nicholas Minkema received the Courage Award for their efforts in rescuing a victim from that house fire," he said. "Battalion Chief Jon Gettemans, Firefighter/Paramedic Dominic Zuccarelli, Firefighter/EMT Aaron Anderson and Firefighter/EMT Dylon Vick each received a Unit Citation for their assistance with patient care and assisting in the rescuing efforts of the patient."

On February 11, the Schererville Fire Department received a call for a structure fire with the caller still inside the residence. Battalion Chief Gettemans, Captain Trevino and Firefighter/EMT Minkema pulled a hose line and entered the residence under heavy smoke conditions, Chief Patterson said, adding "They provided fire extinguishment while simultaneously conducting a search for the victim. Firefighter Minkema located the victim and Captain Trevino assisted with rescuing the victim from the house while Battalion Chief Gettemans continued extinguishing the fire."



Leaf pickup begins week of October 2

Autumn brings falling leaves, and this year the Public Works Department will begin leaf pickup on the south side of U.S. 30 the week of October 3. Leaf pickup begins on the north side of U.S. 30 the week of October 9. Branch pickup also continues through December with both pickups dependent upon weather.

No pickups are scheduled on holidays, including Election Day, Tuesday, November 7; Veteran's Day, Friday, November 10; Thanksgiving, Thursday and Friday, November 23 and 24; Christmas, Monday, December 25 and Tuesday, December 26; and New Year's Eve, Friday, December 29.

Leaf pickup alternates between the south and north sides of U.S. 30 on a weekly basis. The week of Thanksgiving – Monday, November 20 through Wednesday, November 22 – is when crews collect leaves on town properties, including the parks, the water towers, etc, said Chad Nondorf, Public Works Director. "We also use this week to catch up as typically this is when accumulation is the heaviest," Nondorf said.

After the week of Thanksgiving, the regular schedule resumes north of U.S. 30. Leaf and branch pickups continue into December until weather forecasts indicate the Public Works trucks must be readied for snow removal and icy conditions. You can find a printable calendar online at www.Schererville.org. Click on the Documents section.

To ensure your leaves are picked up, please place them in a narrow pile (away from the branches) in the parkway or grassy area between the sidewalk and the curb by 7 a.m. on the Monday morning of your designated week. Please avoid parking any vehicles in front of the leaf piles.

To avoid an ordinance violation and to prevent flooding caused by blockage of storm drains, please don't put leaves in the street. If there is no curb, please place leaves within 5 feet of the street so that Public Works equipment can reach them. And always make certain the leaves are free of other debris.
