

If you love movies, the Lake County Public Library has great news for you! Schererville residents may now use their library card to stream more than 30,000 films, documentaries, and TV shows through a streaming service called Kanopy.

Each resident cardholder is able to borrow 16 shows per month, and stream them on a computer, tablet, or compatible TV. The collection includes critically-acclaimed movies, shows from History Channel and A&E, independent films, and classic cinema. For more information, visit www.lcpl.org/movies.

And there's even more! The Dyer-Schererville Branch, located at 1001 Lincoln Hwy in Schererville, also offers a monthly International Film program, featuring international, foreign language films projected onto a screen in the large meeting room. "This film series enables members of the community to gather and explore cinema from around the globe," said Assistant Manager Kelley McDonnell.

"A Tramway in Jerusalem" (a Jewish comedy/drama) is the August Feature to be shown at 1 p.m. on Monday, August 8, and Saturday, August 13. On a tramway that connects several neighborhoods, a mosaic of people from different religious and ethnic backgrounds are brought together. This film runs 94 minutes in multiple languages with English subtitles.

"A Girl Missing" (a Japanese thriller/drama) is the September Feature. It will be shown at 1 p.m. on Saturday, September 10, and Monday, September 12. A home-care nurse's relationship with the family she has spent years working for is threatened when her nephew is arrested for kidnapping their daughter. This film runs 112 minutes in Japanese with English subtitles.

Tri-Town Safety Village welcomes back children



After two years with many activities put on hold, the Tri-Town Safety Village is ready to welcome back children from throughout Lake County for fun activities and safety instruction.

"We will have more classes to catch up so no child is left behind," said William Jarvis, Executive Director of the Tri-Town Safety Village, located at 1350 Eagle Drive in Schererville. "Lake Central School Corporation Director of Primary Education Dr. Yolanda Bracey in conjunction with Superintendent Dr. Larry Veracco has authorized children to attend from elementary schools in Dyer, Schererville and St. John."

Children in second and fourth grades at those Lake Central elementary schools will begin field trips to the Tri-Town Safety Village soon after school begins August 10, Jarvis said.

A grant from the Crown Point Community Foundation will also provide safety classes at the Tri-Town Safety Village for school children in Crown Point, Cedar Lake, Lowell, Winfield and Hanover Township, he noted. "The foundation members see the value of the Tri-Town Safety Village."

In addition, Lake County is looking to help support unincorporated areas, Jarvis said.

Town council presidents, fire chiefs and police chiefs from Dyer, Schererville and St. John are members of the Tri-Town Safety Village board of directors. "They are the driving force of the Tri-Town Safety Village," Jarvis noted.

Schererville Town Council President Robin Arvanitis serves as President of the Tri-Town Safety Village board of directors. "We are looking to extend the Safety Village classes to those children who are home-schooled," she said.

"I'm just amazed at everything that is offered. The curriculum is new and updated and is beneficial in so many ways. It concentrates on their safety and the safety of others," Arvanitis said. "Firemen and police officers from the community teach these classes and the children get to interact with them."

The Safety Village features several child-sized buildings, paved streets, working traffic lights, a train depot complete with an antique caboose and a Survive Alive House that simulates an actual fire with smoke.

"It's wonderful that the children can go into the Survive Alive House and learn how to escape a fire," Arvanitis said.

In addition to fire safety, the many subjects covered include bicycle safety, bus safety, stranger danger, pool safety, bullying, pedestrian safety, how to deal with insects and animals, and railroad safety.

An added benefit is that children who attend these classes take home that information to their families, Jarvis said. "The children share what they've learned, which helps keep other people safe."

Stash Your Trash!



As more people make Schererville their home, it's important to know how regulations can help maintain the town's quality of life. One of those ordinances governs the storage and placement of garbage and recycling containers both on collection dates and between collection dates.

Ordinance #1801 states that garbage and recycling containers as well as yard waste must be placed on the owner's property or adjacent to the curb within the right of way of the street or alley where that collection is made *after 6 p.m. on the day before scheduled collection*. The containers must then be removed from the collection location *before dusk on the day of collection*.

Especially important is where those containers are stored between collection dates, said Schererville Code Enforcement Officer Sam DeCero.

All containers and garbage must be placed out of sight from the street view between collection dates. They should be placed inside the garage of the residential building or behind screening, fencing or a covering alongside the home. Another option is to store the containers in the back of the property so they can't be seen from the street.

"The purpose of this ordinance regarding the placement of garbage and recycling containers at residential properties is to avoid creating a negative impact on the residential areas of Schererville, as well as for maintenance and preservation of property values and quality of life for all town residents," DeCero noted.

Enforcement actions for violations of these standards can lead to tickets being issued and fines levied.

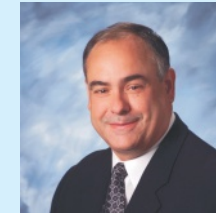

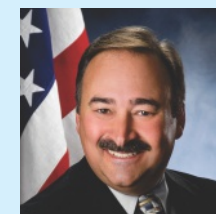

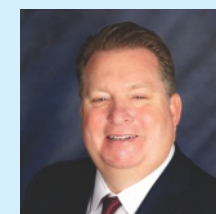

Help provide a fenced-in dog run at the Schererville Animal Control

Did you know that Schererville Animal Control provides shelter for hundreds of animals every year?

"To keep our animals active, healthy and provide the best possible care until they are placed in their forever homes, we are raising funds for a Dog Run," said Angela Malinowski, Director of Schererville Animal Control. "The goal for 2022 is to raise \$4,200."

With the support of community members, these animals can receive the best care, Malinowski noted.

"Even better, if we reach our fundraising goal this year, we'll be able to expand our services to hundreds of animals in our community," she said.

The Dog Run will be constructed with a six-foot high fence on a 25 foot by 50 foot grassy area next to the animal control shelter. It will allow dogs to enjoy the outdoors.

The Schererville Lions Club has set up a go fund me page to raise money for the Dog Run.

Donations can also be made by check to Schererville Animal Control with a notation that the funds are to go for the Dog Run. Those donations can be dropped off at the animal control office, located at 25 E. Joliet Street, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., or mailed to that address.

In addition, donations for the Dog Run can be put in the drop boxes at Schererville Town Hall, 10 E. Joliet Street. The donation should be labeled Schererville Animal Control.



Customers using First Midwest Bank to pay utility bills need to make changes in person

Recently First Midwest Bank was purchased by Old National Bank. Customers who have been using their First Midwest bank accounts to make automatic payments for their Schererville water/sewer utility bills will need to personally update their accounts, said Deputy Clerk Treasurer Kristie Klein.

"We ask that customers who have been using their First Midwest Bank accounts to make automatic payments or who pay their utility bills with Invoice Cloud from First Midwest Bank accounts to come into the Clerk-Treasurer's office located at 10 East Joliet St.," Klein said.

"Please bring a letter from your bank (Old National Bank) with an updated routing number. In addition, if you have an updated account number that should also be in the letter," she added. "This cannot be done over the phone."

Water bills are due on the 24th of each month, Klein said.

Office hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. If you have questions, please call the Schererville Clerk-Treasurer Office at (219) 322-2211, ext. 5.

Grants provide 40 native trees planted in four large Schererville subdivision retention areas

Besides providing shade and a habitat for all sorts of wildlife, trees provide many benefits to our soil, water, air, and lives. This past spring Schererville Public Works received 40 native trees from two very generous grants - 23 trees from the Little Calumet River Basin Development Commission and 17 trees from CommuniTree.



The Little Calumet River Basin Development Commission was created in 1980 by the Indiana General Assembly to serve as the required local sponsor for the [Little Calumet River, Indiana Flood Control and Recreation Project](#). The federal project, which was authorized for construction in the 1986 Water Resources Development Act, is designed to provide structural flood protection up to the 200-year level along the main channel of the Little Calumet River.

In northwest Indiana, the CommuniTree program grew out of the need to promote tree planting, after-planting care and maintenance of trees. CommuniTree is supported by NIRPC (Northwest Indiana Regional Planning Commission) and a dynamic partnership of community, industry and government agencies with the ultimate goal of creating a healthier and more diverse tree population.

"One of our goals this spring was to plant native trees in and along the outer edge of four large subdivision retention areas in Schererville - Autumn Creek, Pine Hill, Tara and the retention areas along Anna Street, Grand Avenue and Lori Lane," said Susan Santino, Landscape Coordinator with Schererville Public Works.

Studies have shown that these trees, as they mature, will help reduce soil erosion and storm water runoff through the root systems, by aerating the soil and absorbing the rain water, and the tree canopy, by helping to disperse the rain water, she noted.

"We are extremely grateful for the support from these organizations and all of the hard work they do to make our communities better for us and the future. Through their commitment, we were able to plant a diverse collection of trees - redbud, bald cypress, tupelo, shingle and swamp white oaks, ironwoods, and lindens which will benefit our community for years to come," Santino added.

New Rohrman Park playground opens

Children can now enjoy the new larger playground at Rohrman Park, located at 6750 Rohrman Road. The new playground, which features separate play areas for children ages 2 to 5 and for children ages 5 to 12, officially opened Saturday, June 16 with a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

The improvements include ADA accessibility for children with disabilities, including sidewalks that tie into existing sidewalks near the park's shelter and changes to the parking area, said John Novacich, Superintendent of the Schererville Parks & Recreation Department.

A Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) of \$122,390 helped pay for the park improvements, Novacich said.

The new playground covers more than 5,000 square feet at Schererville's largest park. The area designed for children ages 2 to 5 features tot swings, slides, and a spinner. A separate set of swings, a climbing structure, and slides are part of the play area designed for children ages 5 to 12.

"There will be a sitting area with benches set between the play areas as well as other benches, but they are currently on backorder," Novacich said.

In addition, the entire playground area has a poured-in place soft rubber surface similar to that used in other Schererville parks, Novacich said.

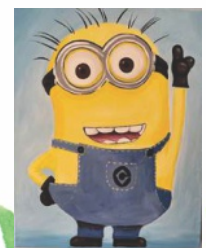
