### Water rate increase

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In an effort to reduce the amount of IAWC's wholesale water rate increase and minimize the impact on the Town's customers, the Town has joined with other wholesale customers from across the state to intervene in the case pending before the IURC and challenged IAWC's proposed rate increase. In fact, the Town and its fellow wholesale customers have hired an expert who has filed testimony and exhibits requesting that the IURC reject IAWC's proposed wholesale water rate increase. A copy of the Town's filings and all filings in the case can be found at the IURC's website, https://in.gov/iurc/ under Cause No. 45870.

At this point, all the testimony and exhibits have been submitted and the IURC has completed the evidentiary hearings. The Town anticipates a final decision from the IURC in the first quarter of 2024. As this matter progresses, the Town will keep you updated on any wholesale water rate increases and the potential impact on the Town.



### Schererville residents urged to sign up for RAVE Alert & Smart 911

In an emergency, seconds count and being prepared is vital. The Town of Schererville and Southcom encourage all Schererville residents to take a proactive approach to personal preparedness by signing up for a free Smart911 account provided by Southcom. This allows residents to receive alerts from the Town via the RAVE Alert System with information including severe weather, road closures, boil water advisories, and local emergencies and how to respond.

Individuals can create a Safety Profile for every person in their households at www.smart911.com or on the Smart911 app that includes any information residents want 9-1-1 and response teams to have in the event of an emergency. This information can include details about family members, photos, medical history, home health care details, pets and emergency contacts. Enter as little or as much as you like, said Kelly Wynkoop, PSAP Manager at Southcom. When an individual calls 9-1-1, that Safety Profile is automatically displayed to the call taker, allowing them to send the right response teams to the correct location with the right information.

With this information, fire crews can arrive at a house fire knowing how many people live in the home and the location of bedrooms. Emergency Medical Services can be advised of allergies or specific medical conditions. And police can have the photo of a missing child in seconds rather than minutes or hours

"The information provided in a Smart911 & Community Alerts make a Safety Profile that helps us respond faster and more efficiently, saving critical time in an emergency when seconds count," said Wynkoop. "By signing up for this service, residents of the Town of Schererville can take action to help better prepare themselves and their families for the next emergency and give local first responders a leg up in a crisis."

Individuals can also opt-in for Alerts, which allows citizens to receive timely and actionable emergency alerts about potentially hazardous situations involving weather, traffic incidents and other emergencies via email, text or voice message. Individuals who sign up will receive tailored alerts based on their specific needs and geographic location, and can choose how they are alerted and communicated with before, during, and after emergencies.

"We have seen the devastation of severe weather throughout the state and in our own backyard, so it is critically important for all of us to remain vigilant and proactive when it comes to emergency preparedness," said Wynkoop. "We urge the residents of the Town of Schererville to sign up for Smart911 & Community Alerts today."

### Schererville faces possible water rate increase

As many of you may know, the Town of Schererville does not have its own source of water supply. The Town buys water on a wholesale basis from Indiana American Water Corporation ("IAWC") and then sells or distributes this water to each of the Town's customers

Earlier this year, IAWC filed a case with the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission ("IURC") seeking to increase its water rates to the Town and other wholesale users across the state by almost 50%. If approved, the proposed increase would cost the Town's municipal water utility approximately \$1,470,682 per year.

While purchasing water from IAWC is one of many expenses for the Town's municipal water utility, such a sizable wholesale water rate increase would lead to an increase in the Town's water bills for its own customers. The Town's financial advisor estimates that IAWC's rate increase would result in a 16% increase to the water bills for the Town's customers. For example, customers using 4,000 gallons per month would see an increase in their monthly water bill from \$24.46 to \$28.35. For those customers using 5,000 gallons per month, their monthly water bill would increase from \$29.52 per month to \$34.21 per month.

### Snow removal involves team effort from everyone

Keeping our streets plowed and salted during snowfall events area for the snow to be pushed to the side when clearing the road. requires a team effort that includes the Public Works Department, residents and businesses. The Public Works Department is responsible for snow removal on approximately 115 miles of streets throughout Schererville. This doesn't include U.S. 30 or U.S. 41, which are maintained by the Indiana Department of Transportation State Highway Department.

Main roadways are plowed and salted first. These streets are usually pre-treated with a brine solution before a winter storm hits. This helps keep the snow from packing and freezing to the pavement. When plows are dispatched to begin plowing, they spread road salt behind each truck using a spinner. Drivers need to keep a minimum distance of 50 feet from the plow to avoid having the salt strike their vehicles.

After the main roadways are completed, the plows begin on the secondary tier streets, usually the main entrances into subdivisions.

The Public Works Department finishes by completing the third tier streets within subdivisions - streets that service the residents of that street and their visitors. The Public Works Department always attempts to keep these streets open, making one or two passes up and down them during a snowfall event. However, pushing the snow back to the curb line is usually not completed until the snow has stopped falling and the main streets and secondary streets have been completed.

Plow trucks must clear snow on streets to the curb line, and that sometimes causes snow to be plowed into cleared driveway entrances. The streets must be clear to the curb line to provide access for emergency vehicles, to provide mailbox access for postal carriers and to expose storm water inlets in case of a rapid thaw.

Cul-de-sacs present several challenges for the Public Works Department. They are wider than most streets which allow them to hold more snow. They also have more driveways. This leaves less

To help with snow removal efforts, we ask residents and businesses to **NOT** shovel snow from driveways into the street. The snow should be pushed to the sides of the driveway. Shoveling snow into the street causes ice patches, creating a hazard for drivers, and increases the amount of snow that may come back into your driveway during snow plowing.

Please help keep fire hydrants clear of snow. This will assist the Fire Department if an emergency arises. Public Works employees are usually not available to do this until after the snow has been plowed from all the streets.

As in the past, salt will continue to be spread on the main roadways. On the second and tier streets, salt will only be applied to the intersections, curves and hills. All drivers should use caution when using the roadways under adverse conditions.

Town Ordinance 791 prohibits parking on the street when there is a snowfall of 2 inches or greater. That Ordinance reads, "No person shall park any vehicle on any street within the corporate limits of the town whenever there is two (2") inches or more of snow thereon, until said snow is removed. Any vehicle which is parked on said street when depth of snow exceeds two (2") inches may be towed away."

Your cooperation is always greatly appreciated so that the Public Works Department can maintain the streets in a safe, efficient and economic manner.

### Apply for your 2024 pets' licenses to avoid late fees

Schererville residents can begin applying for their pets' 2024 licenses on Tuesday, January 2, 2024, at the Schererville Police Department, 25 E. Joliet Street. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.


Please bring proof of your pet's current shot records and proof of spaying or neutering. The Town doesn't keep vaccination/neutering records from year to year. You must bring these papers with you each year. All dogs and cats must be licensed by March 31 of each year, according to Town Ordinance #1549.

That ordinance also limits residents to owning and licensing 5 dogs and/or cats. Fees must be paid by check or cash. Those fees for each pet are as follows:

Spayed or neutered dogs and cats \$ 5.00 \$ 20.00 Non-spayed or non-neutered dogs



\$ 10.00 Non-spayed or non-neutered cats If you don't license your dog or cat by March 31, 2024, you will be charged a \$10 late fee for each pet. Failure to license your dog or cat could result in fines of \$25 to \$2,500, according to Town Ordinance #1549.
