# Online Bill Pay, Paperless Billing

If you need to pay a bill and Town Hall is closed or it's just too late to send a check, you can visit www.schererville.org and under Main Menu click on Pay Water Bill. Choose to do a one-time pay or register. There are several benefits to registering for online billing including: the ability to check previous invoices, the option to go paperless, an easier way to store information, and of course you can pay anytime from anywhere.

Once registered for the automatic withdrawal program, you will never make the common mistake of forgetting to pay your water bill. The payment will be automatically withdrawn on the 24th of every month from a checking account of your specification. It takes the hassle right out of the process, no more checks to write, no need to call and pay over the phone, and best of all no rushing to Town Hall to pay that bill that slipped your mind.

If you sign up for automatic withdrawal, you will still received your water bill as usual. It will be marked with the following: Direct withdrawal - do not send payment. Your bank information will be securely maintained.

pedestrians and bicycles if there is a crosswalk. When entering the roundabout wait for the traffic already moving because it has the right-of-way, and when traffic clears merge right and continue to stay in your lane. Continue through the roundabout until you reach your exit point, and remember to avoid stopping while in the roundabout, traffic is supposed to remain in continuous motion. When exiting, signal and exit to the right. All left turns are completed by circling around the center island and then making a right turn to exit.

days this summer as Schererville, Munster and Dyer work together to repair damage caused by a massive rain storm that dumped 5" of rain in less than an hour last August.

A large diameter drainpipe near the borders of the three towns failed under the road. The towns, together with the Little Calumet River Basin Development Commission, worked with NIES Engineering from Hammond and Christopher Burke Engineering from Rosemont, Illinois to design the repair. The \$1.6 Million storm drain provides protection to almost 1200 homes and businesses and was made

Main Street could be closed for up to 35 possible by the four agencies working together on project design and funding. Schererville will act as project manager for the towns; Gatlin Plumbing from Griffith will do the construction. As a result, Main Street, which carries close to 14,000 vehicles a day, will be limited to local traffic during intermittent closings throughout the 75 days scheduled days of construction. ## HERE WE GO ON THE ROUNDABOUT

When you hear the term roundabout it's hard not to think of "the other side of the pond" where a bright red double-decker bus is winding round and round. But, roundabouts have proven to be very efficient here, helping to reduce accidents, traffic delays, fuel consumption, air pollution and construction costs, while at the same time increasing capacity and enhancing intersection beauty. They have been used to alleviate congestion in residential neighborhoods and are considered one of the safest intersection designs.

Traffic entering a roundabout yields to traffic already in the circle, pavement markings and raised splitter islands direct traffic into a one-way counterclockwise flow, and the radius of the circular road and the angles of entry are designed to slow the speed of vehicles. The only movement allowed upon entry or exit of a roundabout is a right turn, which significantly reduces the likelihood of harmful accidents.

When approaching a roundabout, slow down and stay in your lane and **yield** to all vehicles already in the roundabout. Be sure to obey all one-way signs and yield to continued on back page





Spring has officially arrived. The days are finally warm, and the sun is more than just a far-off light in the sky. With better weather and longer days come outdoor projects and the important reminder for plans of any project requiring excavation: Call 811 first, the national-before-you-dig number. Call two business days prior to digging to ensure all buried utility lines have been properly identified and marked. Striking an underground utility line can be very serious and potentially harmful to you and your neighbors, possibly resulting in costly fines and repairs.

There were nearly 400 cases of system damage caused in 2014 when no markings were requested. Sixty percent of those damages were a result of contractors, while the rest were caused by residents. June, July and September are the top three months in which damages occurred last year.

Here are the five steps for getting your utilities marked:

- 1. **Plan your project**: Know the specific details of where you plan to dig. It is recommended that you mark the area with white paint or flags, so utility operators will know what area to mark.
- 2. Call 811 or enter a request online at www.811NOW.com two business days before the start of your project. You will be given a ticket number and a list of all utility operators who will respond to your request.
- 3. Wait for the marks: It will take approximately two days and each line will be marked with the color that corresponds to the appropriate utility.
- 4. Confirm the marks: Confirm that all utility operators have visited your property by comparing the colored marks on your property with the list given to you. If a utility operator does not locate a line in the designated area, a representative will let you know.
- 5. **Dig with care**: once your utility lines are marked you can begin digging. Indiana state law mandates a two-foot safety zone on either side of the marks.
