Winter Safety Thoughts

Protect Paws from Salt - The salt and other chemicals used to melt snow and ice can irritate the pads of your pet's paws. Wipe all paws with a damp towel before your pet licks them and irritates his or her mouth. Pet-friendly salt can be found at your local pet store.

Avoid Antifreeze Poisoning - Antifreeze is a deadly poison, but it has a sweet taste that may attract animals and children. Wipe up spills and keep antifreeze and other household chemicals out of arms reach. Coolants and antifreeze made with propylene and glycol are less toxic to pets, wildlife and family members.

Be Careful with Cats, Wildlife and Cars - Warm engines in parked cars attract cats and small wildlife to crawl under the hood to stay warm. To avoid injuring any small hidden animals, bang on the hood of your car to scare them away before starting your engine.



BRANCH & LEAF COLLECTION

The Autumn Season is here again and we'll soon be enjoying the delightful changing colors of the leaves that cool nights create. This year the town will start leaf pickup the week of October 17th on the south side of Route 30 and continue until it snows, usually mid-December. The schedule will rotate the north and south sides of Route 30 until the week of Thanksgiving, when the town will complete a "special pick-up" list, such as our water stations and parks. We will resume a rotating schedule the following week on the north side of Route 30. You can find a helpful calendar on the town's website www.schererville.org.

To ensure your branches and leaves are picked up it is important to have them placed in separate piles in the parkway or grassy area between the sidewalk and street by 7:00 AM on the Monday morning of your designated week. Do not put leaves in the street. This helps prevent flooding.
